Human identity exists at the intersection of the ancient cycles of air, water and soil. In spite of the pervasive illusion of separation, in reality, no separation is possible between nature and ourselves. Arne Naess, Professor of Philosophy at Oslo University who coined the term "deep ecology", suggested that we need community therapies 'healing our relations to the widest community, that of all living beings'. John Seed and Joanna Macy have developed numerous such therapies which will be explained and experienced in this workshop. He has published and lectured extensively on deep ecology and has been conducting experiential deep ecology workshops around the world for 25 years. The book "Thinking Like a Mountain – Towards a Council of All Beings" by John Seed, Joanna Macy, Arne Naess & Pat Fleming (1988) has been published in 12 languages. In 1995 he was awarded the Order of Australia Medal (OAM) by the Australian Government for services to conservation. John is donating his fees to protection of rainforests in the <u>Amazon</u> and <u>Cambodia</u>.
